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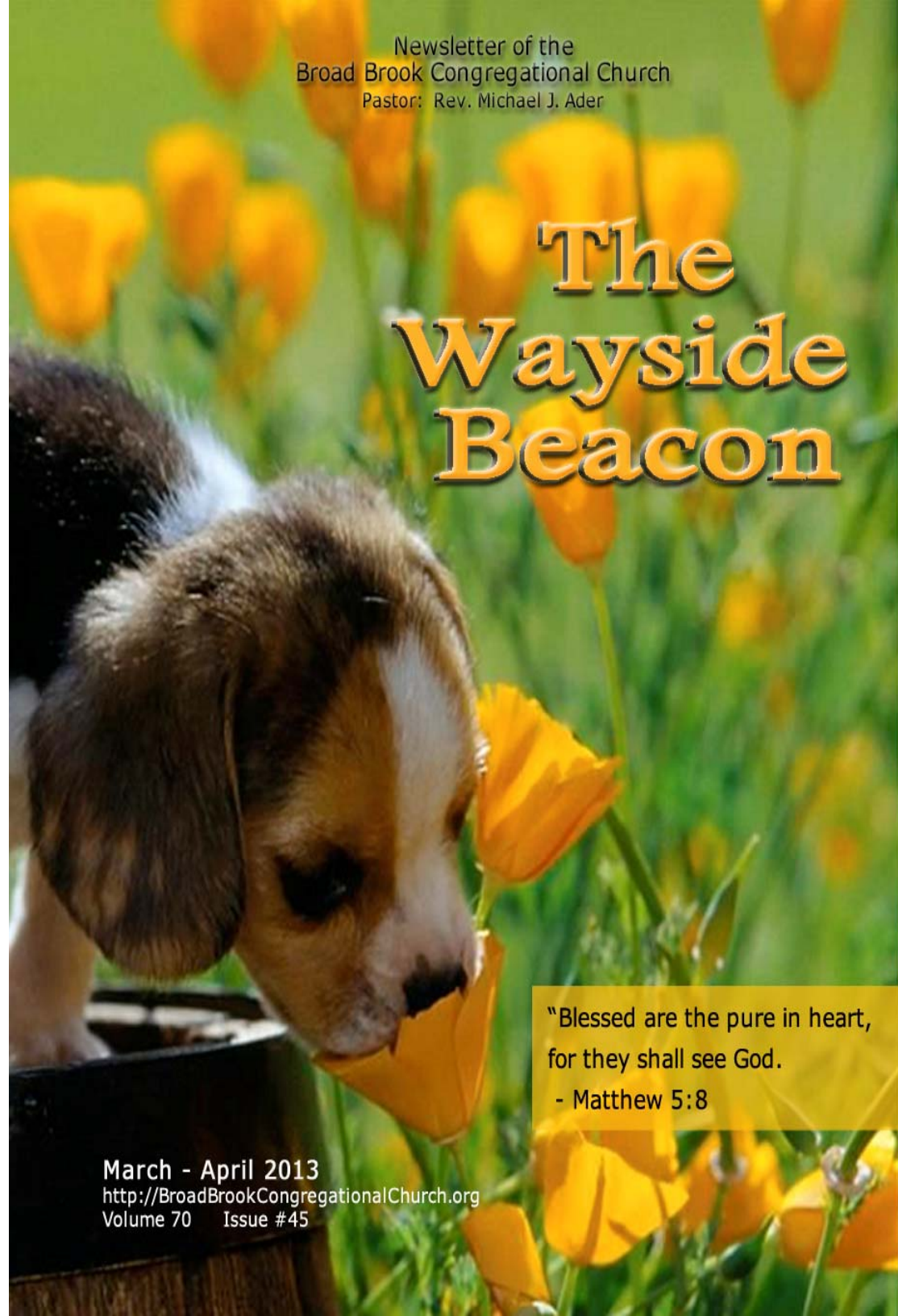

Interim Passages ... A Resurrection Story

Over the course of its history the church has taken on a variety of forms, said a variety of prayers and engaged in a variety of efforts for war and for peace. It has adapted itself very well to the times and the cultures that it serves.

In 20th century America, the church became more of an institution. Accredited seminaries provided professional degrees for clergy. Congregations built education wings and institutional kitchens. They also welcomed the post-war generation with religious education for all ages, Pilgrim Fellowship for the youth, couples clubs and dignified worship services. Their bells rang for worship, and we heeded their call.

Churches hired paid staff, not just clergy, but professional office, maintenance, and education staff as well. They governed with Roberts Rules of Order side by side with the Bible. Managing the institution and programs of the congregation became its “work,” rather than evangelism.

Denominations organized nationally, governing domestic and foreign missions through boards and associations and numerous committees and commissions to address social justice issues. Advocacy for women's issues, peace and youth ministry flourished.

Denominational leaders were on the covers of magazines and in the newspapers. Churches were a cornerstone of community life. Clergy gave the invocation at town meetings, and school systems deferred

to the churches for scheduling of extracurricular activities. Prayer kicked off public school football games and high school graduations.

But this is not how the church has always been. What has just been described is simply how the mainline Protestant church looked in some places of mid-20th century America. The church looked different a hundred years ago, and it will look different a hundred years from now.

We cannot keep beating ourselves up that we are not that church of 1955 any more, trying to maintain that model in a rapidly-changing 21st century. Those cultural factors that supported the massive build-up of the church back then are not part of our culture or society today. A new model of the church has to be formed and will be formed. Lamenting the past will not move us forward.

The best news is that God's Word will thrive no matter what. The Holy Spirit will continue to gather the church when, where and how it pleases, just as it has for over 2,000 years. So give thanks for what the church is and for the ways that God has worked through it. Look forward in faith to how the Spirit will move through this congregation. In this next century we will be challenged and empowered to carry out the same mission of proclaiming the Gospel of Jesus Christ as did our ancestors, only our methods will be different.

We are an Easter church and an Easter people. We are all about the Resurrection. Everything will one day die, but that is the way it is written. Jesus has shown us that out of death comes life, and that everything - even the church we love - dies and rises to new life with Christ.

When I was asked to write a piece about myself for the Wayside Beacon, my first thought was "Oh no, I can't do that -- I don't want to do that."

Then I quickly thought of a quote I'd recently read. It went something like this: "You must do that which you think you cannot do." More importantly, I thought of a quote from the Bible that I had written on a 3x5 index card 50 or 60 years ago when I was raising four young children. "*I can do all things through Christ which strengtheneth me.*" (Philippians IV, 13).

I referred to that index card through the years of the usual small problems of childhood: the noise, the squabbling, the messes, the illnesses. And that quote on the index card did give me strength. Phil was a very good husband, but a farmer works long hours and doesn't have much time to change diapers, etc.

So how does one write about her life without using the words I, me, my or mine too much? Well, I don't know, but I'll try.

I was born on a farm in the small (population at that time was less than 1,000) town of Roxbury, Connecticut, the youngest in a family of five children. It was at the beginning of the Depression - the "real" depression, a time when most people were impoverished. Most people, that is, except our wealthy neighbors, some of whom lived and worked in New York City during the week and came out to the country on the weekends. One such childless couple wanted a baby and asked my parents if they could adopt me. Fortunately, my father said "No." I cannot imagine how my life would have been if I had been adopted.

My days as a young child were spent playing with one of my sisters who was only 20 months older than I was. We would freely wander through the fields and woods, play in the barns and in the brook, go wading and fishing and get excited about 6" trout. Often, we would make up games as we went along.

We went to a one-room schoolhouse, (one teacher for all eight grades) and to the Episcopal Church, though not every Sunday.

“Church” had no special meaning to me. We sat and listened; didn't understand but behaved as we were supposed to behave.

My mother was very strict. She also was quite sickly and died at the age of 46 when I was 10 years old. My father was more lenient and loving, and I idolized him.

After high school I went to UConn, where I met my future husband, Phil. At the end of my freshman year, my father died suddenly of a heart attack at the age of 54, just before final exams. I was 19. My life was turned upside down.

After graduating from UConn with a 2-year certificate in agriculture, I was at loose ends, so I went to Chicago where a good friend was in nurses' training. I got a job in the hospital and rented a room in a private home for \$10 a week. That lasted for three months. Chicago was too much city for a farm girl. Besides, Phil was in Connecticut. I came back and we were married 1 1/2 years later, in 1951.

We joined the Broad Brook Congregational Church, which was Phil's family church. It was quite different from the church I grew up in. I liked the less formal service, the minister Rev. Ralph Beets and the friendliness of the people. I soon became involved and assisted with the nursery age children and have been on various committees, including Mission, Trustees, Stewardship, served as a historian and am presently on the Friendship Committee.

Phil and I have been married for 61 years now, and have been members of the Broad Brook Congregational Church for 60 years.

Oh - the index card? I still have it and occasionally look at, as I did a few days ago when asked to write my story. ☒

Since winter seems to be hanging on this year and I love to eat soup when it is cold out there, you've got to try this recipe! Mike has been making this recipe alternately with some of my other favorite soups all winter long. He likes to put this in his crock pot so it sure makes the house smell good all day!



TANGY BEAN SOUP (6 servings)
 2 cans (14 1/2 oz ea) chicken broth (we use low sodium)
 1 pkg (16 oz) frozen mixed vegetables
 1 can (15 oz) black beans, rinsed & drained
 1 can (15 oz) pinto beans, rinsed & drained
 1 can (14 1/2 oz) diced tomatoes, undrained
 1 medium onion, chopped
 1 tblsp chili powder
 1 tblsp minced fresh cilantro
 4 garlic gloves, minced
 1/4 teaspoon pepper

In a slow cooker, combine the first 10 ingredients. Cover and cook on high for 4 - 5 hours.



minutes longer (without lifting cover on crock pot). After 30 minutes, test dumplings by inserting toothpick in center of dumpling, should come out clean.

CORNMEAL DUMPLINGS:
 1/2 cup all-purpose flour
 1/2 cup shredded sharp cheddar cheese
 1/3 cup cornmeal
 1 tablespoon sugar
 1 teaspoon baking powder
 1 egg
 2 tablespoons milk
 2 teaspoons canola oil

Dumplings: Combine the flour, cheese, cornmeal, sugar and baking powder in a bowl. In another bowl, combine the egg, milk and oil; add to dry ingredients just until moistened (batter will be stiff). Drop by heaping tablespoons onto soup. Cover and cook on high 30
