

By unanimous vote, Rev. Carol Lews was elected to be our new Pastor. She conducted her first Sunday service with us on October 27, 2013.





It was in North Carolina that I could no longer ignore God's knocking at my door – actually I think God was banging on it by that time. (I had begun to hear God's calling when my children were teenagers but felt they needed me more than the church did during those years.) After much time in conversation with my pastor and my husband and a great deal of time in prayer and silent listening, I began my pursuit of ordination.

I am exhilarated, passion-filled and energized when I am ministering in community – a community of committed disciples eager to embrace new opportunities for enriching their faith and putting that faith into action. My ministry is shaped by offering a radical welcoming to the stranger, by inclusivity of thought, word and action, by giving a voice to the powerless and by bringing issues of social justice to the fore.

Another of my passions is biblical study. The Bible for me is not God's inerrant word but rather a treasure trove of God's interaction with humanity and all creation. I listen as our still-speaking God brings to life the ancient texts as the Holy Spirit opens the "ears" of my heart to hear the voices of the people, both past and present. As I lead a group of seekers, I rejoice when new revelations are experienced.



God's accuracy may be observed in the hatching of eggs. For example:

- -the eggs of the potato bug hatch in 7 days;
- -those of the canary in 14 days;
- -those of the barnyard hen in 21 days;
- -The eggs of ducks and geese hatch in 28 days;
- -those of the mallard in 35 days

The eggs of the parrot and the ostrich hatch in 42 days.

(Notice, that the numbers are all divisible by seven, the number of days in a week!)

God's wisdom is seen in the making of an elephant. The four legs of this great beast all bend forward in the same direction. No other quadruped is so made. God planned that this animal would have a huge body, too large to live on two legs. For this reason He gave it four fulcrums so that it can rise from the ground easily.

The horse rises from the ground on its two front legs first. A cow rises from the ground with its two hind legs first.

from Rev. Mike Ader



"In a little while I Kev. MIKE Ade will be gone, and you will see me no longer" (John 16:16)

This will be my last letter in the "The Wayside Beacon." My fifteen-month interim ministry with Broad Brook Congregational Church is at an end with the selection of your new settled pastor.

Saying "good-bye" is something most of us would like to avoid altogether, or at least substitute for it a more ambiguous, "See you around." But the fact is, I won't see you around after November 1. 


