
A Message From Rev. Carol Lewis


A minister parked his car in a no-parking zone in a large city because he was short of time and couldn't find a space with a meter. He put a note under the windshield wiper that read:




Much to the delight of the editor, it went on for weeks until someone wrote this clincher:



Strawberry Rhubarb Dessert

Here is a great lazy summer recipe for a dessert I make all summer long because our rhubarb grows like weeds!!! This recipe is in our cookbook on page 81. If anyone would like some rhubarb to make the recipe.....just ask...we'll pick it for you, just come and get it or we can bring some to church on Sunday mornings. - Debbie Siekiera

4 to 6 cups of fresh Rhubarb cut into 1" pieces
1 - 3oz. pkg strawberry or raspberry jello (sugar free jello is my preferred choice)
³/₄ cup white granulated sugar
1 - 18oz pkg white or yellow cake mix
¹/₄ cup butter, melted

1 cup cold water



1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Prepare a 9 x 13 sheet pan by spraying it with Pam or equal product.

2. Wash, trim then slice rhubarb into 1 inch pieces. Place and spread the pieces into bottom of sheet pan, spreading the pieces equally.

3. Pour Jello packet equally over the rhubarb, then the sugar.

4. Spread the dry cake mix evenly over the rhubarb pieces.

5. Melt the butter then slowly pour it over the cake mix in a back and forth motion.

6. Add the cold water carefully pouring it over the dry cake mix.

7. Bake in a preheated oven for approx 45 minutes. The top will get golden brown. The jello juices will be bubbling.

- We modified restrooms to be more wheelchair friendly.

- We replaced our side entrance stairs with lower stair risers, a larger landing outside the door and added handrails to both sides of the stairs.




