As you reached the end of your high school years, depending on where and when you attended, you were probably faced with making

decisions, very possibly for the first time, about some of the subjects you were going to study, the courses that you could choose for yourself, the areas of study that would be known as your electives. If you went on from high school and attended a specialized technical school, or went to college, then you certainly had to make decisions about them.

Now whichever school you attended you had to take certain required courses, the basic stuff that the school considered essential for an educated graduate to have an understanding of. Subjects such as mathematics, reading, language, and writing. The required courses changed if you went on to higher levels of learning, and the subjects you studied became more and more specialized as you ascended the educational ladder.

Whichever school you attended, the required courses were, and still are, the basic blocks of knowledge and information that the student must master before she or he gets to choose the elective subjects that will round out the educational process.

When you stop to think about it, our lives are pretty much made up of the same components as our education was. There are certain things in life that you have to do, certain subjects that you have to study, certain classes that we all have to knuckle down and take.

It is not too difficult to think of some of life's required subjects: work, illness, taxes, birth, death, obeying the law, and so on. These are the things that we all have to deal with, whether we like them or not. They are necessary building blocks for maintaining our society as we know it.

But, there are also life's electives, the things that we choose, once we have taken care of life's requirements. The things we decide to do, or not do, such as get married. The decisions we make about where, and how, and with whom, we will live. What moral values will we hold to? Will we support charity? Will we smoke, take drugs, drink? Will we try to lead a healthy life? Will we bother to exercise? Will we try to save some money for a rainy day?



Religion is one of life's electives. We can embrace it, or reject it completely. We can take a course but then drop the subject once the course is finished. We can take a course, but never pay the tuition. We can pay the tuition but never show up. We can put some effort into it, or just slide by, settling for a low grade.

So tell me, as you think about it, which do you think have had the most influence on who, and where, you are today; your required courses, or your electives? Would you change some of those electives you chose because they looked easy, but left you with an empty feeling of regret? Are you glad that you decided to take that more difficult elective that has subsequently paid you back, many times over?

We should choose our electives wisely. They had a certain importance to us in high school, but in life they are vital to our well being. To a large extent we are the result of our electives, and the world does not allow us a do-over.

So, if you sit there just regretting some of the choices you have made, hearing the world tell you that it's your own fault, you made

your bed, and now you must lie on it, you brought this on yourself, and other such, in all probability true, but

hateful, remarks, don't despair.

The world may not give you a chance to change - but Jesus does. Listen to this from the Bible:


Be careful not to judge people by what they seem to be, even though we once judged Christ in that way.

Did you hear that? Say that bit in capitals again to yourself - out loud. With Christ you get to choose new electives for yourself. You can be a new person, and the past will be forgotten. You have got to want to change, choose some new electives, and show up and do it, but think of the peace that could bring to your life.




#### The Constitution and By-Laws Revision Committee




